Dear P5 Parents/Guardians.

Welcome back to West Grove Primary School!

We hope you have had a rejuvenating and meaningful March holiday with your child. With Safe Management Measures (SMM) still in place for COVID-19, the school will continue to plan for engaging and enriching experiences for your child in term 2.

Since 2019, the Student Development Department (SDD) has adopted the **PROSPER** framework (T. Noble and H. McGrath) to guide us in our students' wellbeing programmes, where we Encourage **Positivity**, Build **Relationships**, Facilitate **Outcomes**, Focus on **Strengths**, Foster a sense of **Purpose**, Enhance **Engagement** and Teach **Resilience**.

As we embark on our exciting journey this term, let us focus on **student outcomes**. Outcomes involve making progress towards goals and feeling capable to do schoolwork. This is the time your child should be reviewing his/her goal in studies for the year and understand that accomplishment depends on hard work and effort. Being persistent and having a "growth mindset" are all part of this learning journey. We encourage parents to work closely with your child and his/her teachers to focus on building good learning attitudes and habits and to celebrate every accomplishment in a wide range of school-based outcomes (both academic and co-curricular).

Assessment Matters

Primary School Leaving Examination (PSLE) Scoring

Over the years, our education system has changed to help our students discover and develop their strengths and interests, while moving away from an over-emphasis on academic results.

Primary school's PSLE scoring changes were introduced in 2021 to reduce an overemphasis on academic results. The PSLE Score replaces the T-score Aggregate. The PSLE changes aim to:

- Reduce fine differentiation of students' examination results at a young age based on scores
- Recognise a student's achievement regardless of how his/her peers have done
- Encourage families to choose secondary schools holistically based on students' strengths, interests and abilities.

This will allow students to focus on their own learning and develop their strengths and abilities, rather than comparing themselves to their peers.

PSLE Scoring System - Achievement Levels

Since 2021, PSLE results have been presented using Achievement Levels (AL). Each subject will be scored using 8 AL (as shown in the table below), with AL 1 being the best score and AL 8 being the lowest score. Your child's PSLE score will be a sum of the scores for all four subjects. This information can also be found in your child's Student Handbook on page 19.

Assessments in Term 2

The dates and topics of the assessments to be held in Term 2 are as follows. I hope that the information will better help your child in planning for his/her revision.

In the event of an absence on the day of the assessment, your child needs to produce a **medical certificate or have a valid reason with supporting documents**. Please note that there will be **no make-up assessment**.

Students who are on Stay Home Notice (SHN), isolation orders or are unwell with flulike symptoms such as fever, running nose, sore throat and cough will not be allowed to take the assessments for the full duration of the SHN, isolation order or MC. Please keep your child at home and ensure that there is a negative swab test result (if any) before returning to school.

Students who are on Health Risk Notice (HRN) will be allowed to take the assessments if they test negative on a self-administered ART before coming to school for each assessment.

Do inform your child's form teacher in such events.
